Course Description and Purpose

This course will survey some of the most widely used and discussed sociological ideas, concepts and theories. It will situate these basic contemporary ideas within the longer traditions and classical schools of thinking and theorizing about society and social issues. The course will approach these ideas through their grouping in broad themes and their relations over time. It will go over the key concepts that are building blocks of these ideas and theories and will introduce major theorists who developed them.

Course Goals

A central goal will be understanding these abstract sociological theoretical ideas and concepts in a concrete and practical enough way to be able explain and apply them to real world events and issues.
