Course Description and Purpose

Examines social problems in critical and global perspectives. Considers social problems in terms of global issues such as inequality, poverty, politics, crime/justice, violence, genocide, and war.

The purpose of the course is to develop, broaden, and deepen students' critical thinking skills and knowledge regarding a variety of social problems in our time.

Expectations of this Course

This is an online course, which means most (if not all) of the coursework will be conducted online. Expectations for performance in an online course are the same as for a traditional course. In fact, online courses require a degree of self-motivation, self-discipline, and technology skills which can make these courses more demanding for some students.

Students are expected to:

- review the getting started page located in the course modules;
- introduce themselves to the class during the first week by posting a selfintroduction in the appropriate discussion;
- take the practice quiz to ensure that their computer is compatible with the learning management system, Canvas;
- interact online with instructor and peers; review and follow the course calendar and weekly outlines;
- log in to the course at least 3 times per week; respond to discussions by the due date specified.
- respond to emails within 2 business days; submit assignments by the corresponding deadline

The instructor will:

- log in to the course daily on business days;
- respond to emails/messages within 2 business days;
- grade assignments and provide feedback within 7 days of the assignment deadline.

In general, I will grant each student one deadline extension per term regardless of the reason upon request. After that, no deadlines can be extended without documentation from the Disability Resource Center.
