Course Description and Purpose

What is the individual? What is the individual's relationship to society?

This course encourages critical thinking about how people influence and are affected by their social worlds. This course focuses on how we experience life as individuals and as members of our culture. Cross-disciplinary perspectives are compared/contrasted with sociological views. Local and global examples are investigated.

Much of the way that we conceive of the relationship between the individual and society comes from Western notions of the self: an autonomous, isolated, able to make decisions for oneself and responsible for one's own actions. We will be examining how the self constructs itself out of cultural and social materials, and how society is constructed through the interactions of multiple individual selves.

Course Goals

Students will be able to:

- Outline the relationship between biology and society in the creation of the "individual."
- Describe how the concept of the "individual" developed in Western societies.
- Identify the social forces and social relations that shape the "individual" in our society Explain how one's position (gendered, racial, age, class) within unequal societies allow for different kinds of expression of individuality.
- Analyze how macro-social forces have an impact on the individual.

Expectations of the Course

This is an online course, which means most (if not all) of the course work will be conducted online. Expectations for performance in an online course are the same as a traditional course. In fact, online courses require a degree of self-motivation, self-discipline, and technology skills which can make these courses more demanding for some students.

Students are expected to:

- review the getting started page located in the course modules;
- introduce yourself to the class during the first week by posting a self-introduction in the appropriate discussion;

- interact online with instructor and peers;
- review and follow the course calendar and weekly outlines;
- log in to the course **3-4 times** per week, if not daily;
- respond to discussions by the due date specified. Late work is subject to grade deductions;
- respond to emails or Canvas messages within 1 day;
- **submit** assignments by the corresponding deadline;
- Check regularly for announcements

The instructor will:

- log in to the course 6 times per week;
- respond to emails or Canvas messages within 1 day;
- respond to general discussion posts within 2 days;
- grade assignments and/or provide feedback within **7 days** of the assignment deadline.

Assignments

Reading Assignments

 Weekly Reading Assignment: You will be completing a written assignment weekly based on the assigned readings. See Canvas for further detailed guidelines.

The reading assignments will have firm due dates each week, but they will all be available starting August 26th. If you manage your time well, you can work ahead.

Discussion Posts

Each week, you will need to respond to one discussion prompt and reply to one peer. Make sure to answer the prompt early enough in the week to allow others the opportunity to comment on your posts before the due dates. Remember, this is an academic forum, so pay close attention to grammar and punctuation. Since your discussion posts will be visible to your peers, choose your content thoughtfully. You will need to read multiple sources each week and provide a response to one prompt, with your response requiring a minimum of 250 words. Your peer response should be at least 150 words.

Final Essay**

For this Final essay, you will be given a prompt. To address the given prompt, you will use the readings from this course to write a short (750-800 words) essay expressing your views on the social issue assigned. You do not have to use outside sources but you should cite the readings that you use. Keep it tight and focused. Use the Turnitin dropbox to attach your file. Review the detailed Turnitin Instructions on how to submit your assignments and how to review the Grademark comments (feedback) from your professor. You must turn in your paper by the deadline (see course calendar). You will find further detailed guidelines on Canvas.

The essay will be graded on the following rubric:

- Organization: Is the introduction clear? Do you provide an overview of your argument early? (20 points)
- Focus and detail: Do you stay on topic as you provide support for your argument?
 Is your argument clear and focused? (20 points)
- Voice: Do I hear you in the essay? Why do you hold these opinions? (20 points)

- Sentence structure, grammar, mechanics: This is not an English class but is your writing clear? (5 points)
- Use of class readings as sources: Refer to the class readings as you write. (35 points)

Final Essays will be graded within 7 days.

Policy on the use of generative artificial intelligence tools:

Using an AI-content generator such as ChatGPT to complete assignment without proper attribution violates academic integrity. By submitting assignments in this class, you pledge to affirm that they are your own work and you attribute use of any tools and sources. I recognize that learning to use AI responsibly and ethically is an important skill in today's society. Be aware of the limits of conversational, generative AI tools such as ChatGPT.

- Quality of your prompts: The quality of its output directly correlates to the quality of your input. Master "prompt engineering" by refining your prompts in order to get good outcomes.
- Fact-check all of the AI outputs: Assume it is wrong unless you cross-check the claims with reliable sources. The currently AI models will confidently reassert factual errors. You will be responsible for any errors or omissions.

Full disclosure: Like any other tool, the use of AI should be acknowledged. At the end of your assignment, write a short paragraph to explain which AI tool and how you used it, if applicable. Include the prompts you used to get the results. Or you can simply cite the tool used as you would any other source. For example, if you use ChatGPT-3, you must cite "ChatGPT-3. (YYYY, Month DD of query). "Text of your query." Generated using OpenAI. https://chat.openai.com/"
