Course Description and Purpose

Sociology is one of the most interesting subjects in the world, and one that we can all relate to. I intend to make this an extremely interesting, interactive and FUN class! All I ask is that you participate, show respect for your classmates, inject your experience and interest, and enjoy the class! I am here to help you learn, and I want to also learn from you!

This course offers an introduction to sociology as a way of understanding complex social, political, and economic phenomena in the world. Sociology is a field of study that focuses on social structures, social forces, and group interactions. Specifically, this course will concentrate on several important sociological topics such as culture, the social construction of knowledge, "race," gender, and economic inequality, as well as political sociology. This is what you might call a "global learning" class.

Course Objectives

Sociologists look at the world, society and how we act from a broader, *sociological perspective* – that is, looking at things from diverse, broader, societal-wide ways (different from how many people traditionally see the world). This is one of the major objectives for this class, where combining and developing critical thinking skills are applied to the understanding of major themes in society. Thus, by the end of the class, students should be able to:

- Understand the main sociological theoretical perspectives.
- Apply these perspectives to contemporary social problems.

- Develop insight into the critical link between social structure and individual circumstances.
- Acquire analytical skills for understanding and evaluating social phenomena and the interactions from which they emerge.


